Women who keep up an interclub contact by "opening their doors to each other". The idea started in 1980, and now numbers 93 different groups of International Women's Clubs

located in 48 countries, and from whose network of individual clubs many new members have joined our various Welcome Clubs around the world.

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CIRCLE OF FRIENDS

April 20: Council Member Arrivals

April 21: Other Delegates arrive. Council Meeting, while other participants will have an optional City Tour.

April 22: Opening Ceremony followed by lunch. Afternoon: Council meeting, while other Conference participants visit the Lung Shan Temple. Evening: Welcome Reception and Dinner.

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WCI CELEBRATES 15 YEARS



Marian Adair

LINK has already published the story of how Marian Adair not only had the idea, but went ahead and formed a committee with eight other interested ladies to start a club to welcome international ladies in Washington, D.C. in 1959, known as Welcome to Washington, that would be very special and different from any of the other organizations that already filled the nation's Capital.

Marian attributes her interest in international culture, language, and people to the early influence of a high school teacher from Paris, who was her French teacher in a small town in Michigan. Until then, Marian had little exposure to the rest of the world, although later in life, she was to marry a man who became a Congressman, and thereafter the Ambassador from the U.S. to Ethiopia. Because Marian is, and always has been, a woman of vision, she anticipated that this new club she was starting would be dedicated to women who would be willing to donate their time and talents to others, and at the same time, be self supporting, and interested in building bridges of international understanding.

Because everything in Washington was filled with politics and protocol, not to mention the influence of money, and because they did not want to compete with other established clubs, Marian and her committee decided to adopt a policy that would be different from all the other organizations. That policy specified No politics, No protocol, No projects (money raising) and No pay (everyone would work voluntarily).

By 1986, Welcome to Washington was well established, and Marian, who in the meantime, had been living in Indiana, now returned to Washington, where Ruth Munn who was then the president of W/W, asked Marian to take over the position of Sister Club Liaison. Again, Marian formed a committee and made contact with other former members of W/W who had now started clubs in such places as London, Denver, Brussels, and eventually Florida, Zurich, Ottawa, and Taiwan, wherever W/W members had moved and felt the need for a Welcome Club in a foreign land among foreign neighbours, with a foreign language. The vision Marian worked to achieve was to build both understanding and friendship between women of different cultures and her ambassadors of good will were none other than former members of W/W. The group adopted the name of Welcome Clubs, International and it was wholly subsidized by Welcome to Washington.

One of the first biennial trips, although at that time it was only a loose concept, and not a Conference as would later develop, was a group of ladies, mostly from Washington, who travelled to Taiwan in 1988 at the invitation of the Taiwan club. Two years later, a group visited the London club, and by 1992, when Ruth Munn was Chairman of WCI, having succeeded Marian, a loose conference was held in Brussels consisting of representatives from many of the so-called Sister Clubs. They held a meeting early in the week to introduce the representatives from around the world, and at the end of a wonderful week of sightseeing, entertainment, and fine eating, another short business meeting was held, mostly to determine where the next Conference would meet.

Betty Carey was influential in convincing Denver that they should be the next hosts for 1994, and everyone that attended that Conference came back with glowing reports of what a wonderful experience it was. Denver introduced the "one on one" dinner, to which all the attendees were divided into groups of 3 or 4, and invited for a home cooked meal in a private home so that hosts and guests could get better acquainted. It was a huge success and was repeated (in 1996) in Zurich, and (in 1998) in Florida.

In the meantime, WCI was continuing to grow, and after the Conference in Zurich, it was realized that an interim business meet-

ing would be advantageous, and this took place in Washington, until then, still the sponsoring organization of WCI. Faye Wickersham became the third chairman of WCI, and during the Florida meeting, a set of Guidelines for WCI was drawn up. In addition, it was noted that financial sponsors were desperately needed to help defray expenses. It was decided to seek \$100.00 from 100 people, and in fact the list of sponsors became oversubscribed by a few, giving WCI a much needed boost to cover office expenses, and to help defray the expenses necessary during the planning stages of conferences. During Faye's administration, WCI continued to expand in the world, and in fact, began to break loose from Washington, since it became clear an international organization had to be just that, namely international, and it could not continue to be seen as an appendage of Welcome to Washington.

In 2000, a very interesting Conference devoted to the theme of "When Women Care" took place in both Ankara and Istanbul. The value of Education to the country as a whole was stressed, throughout, and the Conferees had a chance to visit some of the educational institutions to see first hand, how volunteers were able to enrich the lives, both mentally and physically, of the poor and illiterate. It was proof positive that caring makes a difference, and that a group of women world wide, can help one another!

WCI is definitely on its way, living up to the vision that its founder Marian Adair has stressed from the very beginning, back in 1959 with the founding of Welcome to Washington.

At the Conference in Turkey, Eshrat Demougeot became the 4th Chairman of the WCI Council/Executive Committee and at the interim meeting in Washington a few months after that, it became obvious that the time had come to enter the electronic world, and again the need for funds was noted. WCI, Inc. now has a website, <http://www.welcomeclubs.org> and all the Sister Clubs are connected. In addition, there is now a Circle of Friends available for anyone who would like to contribute (for whatever reason) to the financial support of WCI.

Now, all eyes are focused on the next Conference, planned for 2002 in Taiwan.
